APPROVAL OF MCS NONSTANDARD COURSE WAIVER REQUEST FORM

Upon the recommendation of Dr. Brown and a motion by Mr. Scott, seconded by Mrs. Yancey, the Board voted, 5-0, and the motion carried to approve the MCS Nonstandard Course Waiver Request Form.

Madison Consolidated Schools is seeking approval to authorize the completion of the waiver as needed and submit to IDOE in order for students to graduate on time. The Core 40 document, attached, indicates how many credits graduates must earn in math courses to be eligible for graduation.

There are two paths:

- Path 1-2 credits in Algebra I, 2 credits in Geometry, and 2 credits in Algebra II along with having to take an additional math course or quantitative reasoning course each year in high school.
- Path 2- complete Integrated Math I, II, and III as well as take an additional math course or quantitative reasoning course each year of high school.

The following scenarios might require our school counselors to put students in a mix of these courses which require the Nonstandard Course Waiver to be approved by the board:

- Transfer to MCHS from out of state
- Transferring between ENGAGE or SELECT to a traditional classroom

APPROVAL OF REVISED MCS POLICY 6144 – INVESTMENT INCOME
